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elcome to Athens, a small town with a big university, which comes right into downtown. There's a high degree of walkability, especially among the intown neighborhoods and on campus. Athens is big enough for all kinds of interesting aspects—music, arts and food, pleasing architecture, outdoor activities—yet small enough that neighbors get to know each other. So enjoy your stay, whether it's a weekend, four years or the rest of your life. Or, if you already live here, browse our guide, anyway. You never know, you might learn yet another reason why people here like Athens so much.

How Athens Is Run

Athens residents are represented by 10 commissioners in 10 districts and a mayor, currently Nancy Denson, who is elected at-large. (District maps, contact information and meeting agendas are available at **athensclarkecounty.com**.) Local elections are nonpartisan and are conducted in May in conjunction with the Republican and Democratic primaries for state and federal office.

Get Schooled

The Clarke County School District, governed by a nine-member school board, operates 14 elementary schools, four middle schools and three high schools that educate more than 12,000 students. They've mostly improved recently under Superintendent Philip Lanoue in spite of high poverty rates and a sizable percentage of students who are speakers of English as a second language. The 72.3 percent graduation rate in 2013, up two points from 2012, was above the state average. For more information, see clarke.k12.ga.us.

The Athens area also has eight private schools: Athens Academy (PK-12), Athens Christian School (PK-12), Athens Montessori School (PK-8), Monsignor Donovan Catholic High School (9-12), Prince Avenue Christian School (PK-12), St. Joseph's Catholic School (PK-8), Waseca School (PK-5) and Westminster Christian Academy (PK-12).

Town and Gown

UGA is not the only local institute of higher learning. Piedmont College has a small campus in a former church complex on Prince Avenue, and the University of North Georgia has a branch in Watkinsville. But UGA, in addition to being a top public university, is the city's largest economic engine (generating \$2 billion annually in the local economy) and one of its cultural centers as well. UGA is a big part of what makes Athens Athens.

- North Campus: Athens was built adjacent to what we now call North Campus across Broad Street from downtown. It's the oldest and one of the most beautiful parts of the city. Don't let the high iron fence put you off. Walk right through the iconic Arch and have a picnic or play frisbee. It's public property and functions like a park for students and townies alike.
- **Entertainment**: UGA has departments of theatre, film, dance, music, visual arts and more. All of them constantly produce and showcase cultural events and artifacts, and they really want you to share in these offerings. UGA's master calendar at calendar.uga.edu will tell you everything that's happening on campus. And pay close attention to The Calendar at flagpole.com/events and in the weekly Flagpole to stay in the know about campus happenings.

Of particular note are the UGA Performing Arts Center and the Georgia Museum of Art, both located on East Campus off River Road. The performing arts center will host such world-renowned acts as NPR raconteur and author Garrison Keillor, the State Ballet Theatre of Russia and the Count Basie Orchestra during its 2014-2015 season (see pac.uga.edu for more). The art museum (georgiamuseum.org) features an astonishing-for-its size collection that includes works by Winslow Homer, Georgia O'Keeffe and many others, as well as numerous special exhibits and films.

• Learning: The university is constantly hosting lectures, seminars, workshops and readings—many of them free and open to the public—by both local and visiting academics, artists, writers and experts in diverse fields. Again, keep an eye on The Calendar in the weekly Flagpole and at flagpole.com/ events.


Many lectures are held in the historic Chapel on North Campus. Hear a bell ringing? That's the Chapel bell, rung by students to celebrate football victories or, really, any reason at all.


• Sports: The Bulldog Nation will be out in force during the seven homegame weekends this fall, often more than doubling the city's population. (Sanford Stadium holds 92,746 people, and tens of thousands more will flood the town and camp out on bar stools for big games.) Be sure to wear red and black to fit in. Avoid yellow (Georgia Tech) and orange (Auburn, Florida, Tennessee) at all costs.

Though it may be hard to believe, football isn't the only game in town. UGA's softball team, for example, advanced to the Super Regional round of the NCAA Tournament this year for the sixth time since 2007. The Gym Dogs women's gymnastics team, too, is routinely one of the best in the country. Other programs have produced stars like John Isner—who won the longest-ever professional tennis match in history, 11 hours and 5 minutes, at Wimbledon in 2010—Bubba Watson, who won the Masters in 2012 and 2014; and Olympic Gold Medalist swimmer Allison Schmitt.

While the high-profile student sports—football, basketball (men's and women's), baseball and gymnastics—charge for tickets, all the others—from tennis to swimming to women's softball and soccer—are free. Visit **georgiadogs.com**.

How Do I Get There?

• Bus: City buses are based at the Multimodal Transportation Center on the eastern edge of downtown at 775 E. Broad St., behind the Classic Center. Buses run every hour or half-hour Monday through Saturday starting at 6 a.m. Some make their last stops at 6 p.m., others at 10 p.m. Adult fares are \$1.75; discounts for multi-ride passes, seniors, children and the disabled are available. UGA students, staff and faculty (including retirees) ride free when they swipe their UGACards. See athenstransit.com for routes and schedules.

UGA buses run more frequently in and around campus, and they're free for everyone, including non-students. For instance, the Milledge Avenue buses make a continuous loop from downtown through campus to Five Points and are free to all. The Health Sciences buses run every 20 minutes from campus along Prince Avenue to Normaltown and back when school is in session. Maps and more for all campus-transit routes at **transit.uga.edu**.



For longer-distance travel, Southeastern Stages operates daily inter-city bus service to Atlanta, the Carolinas and beyond; its station is inside the Texaco convenience store at 4020 Atlanta Highway and operates daily from 8 a.m.-1 p.m. and 8 p.m.-9:30 p.m. 706-549-2255 or go to southeasternstages.com. Megabus offers daily rides to and from Atlanta, Charlotte, NC and Washington, D.C. for as low as \$1 per fare. Buses depart and arrive at the Multimodal Transit Center every day but Sunday, when they rendezvous at the UGA East Campus Parking Deck. For more info or to book fares, go to us.megabus.com.

- Rail: The nearest Amtrak station is in Gainesville, with the next closest in Atlanta. There's one northbound train at night and one southbound train early in the morning. Both are stops on the Crescent line between New York City and New Orleans. Call 800-USA-RAIL or go to amtrak.com.
- Air: As of September, 2014 Athens will be without a scheduled air carrier, though local officials are trying to recruit one.
- Shuttle: Groome Transportation runs a full schedule of shuttle vans from the Georgia Center on campus, the Holiday Inn downtown and Athens West Shopping Center on the Atlanta Highway to Hartsfield-Jackson International Airport in Atlanta daily. Call 800-896-9928 or go to groometransportation. com.
- Car: If you must drive, downtown metered parking is 75 cents an hour, with two-hour time limits from 8 a.m.-6 p.m. (You have to feed the meters until 10 p.m., but the time limit ends at six.) Overstay your quarters and get a \$10 ticket; overextend your time and get a \$15 ticket; fail to pay your fines and get a boot on your wheel. Many of the meters (some of which are kiosks that serve multiple spaces) now take credit cards and even allow you to pay by smartphone, but some are still coin-operated. There are also several parking

decks downtown (see map on p. 35) that cost \$1.50 per hour after the first (free) half hour, up to \$8 a day, with no time limit. Details are available at **downtownathensga.com**. Most surface lots downtown are operated at night by Prestige Parking, which charges \$5 and will tow you if you "forget" to pay.

On campus, a good rule of thumb is that, if you drive onto campus, you can only park in a deck. Most surface lots are permit-only, and rules are strictly enforced with high ticket fees and towing. Be prepared: call **706-542-PARK** or go to **parking.uga.edu**—or better yet, just walk, bike or bus free to campus.

- Taxi: If you're out drinking, take a cab home if it's too far to walk. There are a bunch of companies in the phone book, or you can usually hail a taxi downtown in front of the Arch on Broad Street late at night. Pro tip: The cabs are large vans shared with other riders, and they tend to fill up, so your route home may be less than direct. And, make absolutely sure that the van you get into is actually a legitimate cab. A permit and fares should be posted on the dashboard, and the vehicle should have a special license plate.
- **Bike**: You can bike just about anywhere and everywhere in Athens. For all your local cycling needs, look to BikeAthens, whose bike map, available around town and at **bikeathens.com**, is only one of the many excellent resources they have to offer.
- **Hoof It**: You can walk just about anywhere, too. It feels good, and it's good for you and for the environment.

Breakin' the Law

- **Smoking**: It's illegal inside any public building (even bars), in public parks and on most parts of the UGA campus.
- **Drinking:** At a bar and want to sneak a cig outside? Make sure you stay inside the iron railing that delineates a sidewalk cafe from the sidewalk, because open containers are illegal in the public right-of-way, except for the UGA campus on football game days. Last call is 2 a.m. except for Sundays. Bars can't open on Sundays, but restaurants that also sell food and stores can sell alcohol from 12:30 p.m.-midnight.
- **Underage drinking**: The cops are not messing around. If you're under 21 years old and they catch you drinking or with a fake ID, it's not just a ticket. They will throw you in the paddy wagon (seriously) and take you to jail.

Oh, and don't be that guy who can't hold his liquor, either. Fighting, urinating in the street and other forms of jackassery are illegal, too.

- Bikes: Bicyclists have to follow the same rules as cars. Aside from that, be polite and be careful (and wear a helmet—it's not the law, but it can be vital to your health). Also, you can't ride on the sidewalk unless you're 12 years old or under, and not even then if you're downtown. Drivers: You are required to give cyclists a three-foot berth when passing.
- Littering: Don't. Downtown has trash cans and has receptacles for cigarette butts. Use them. Even better, recycle—there are bins for bottles, cans and paper all over downtown, and your trash pickup provider will come to your house and get your recyclables for free.
- **Cohabitation**: It's illegal for more than two unrelated people to live in houses in areas zoned single-family. If the area is multi-family, it's fine. Check with the ACC Planning Department before signing a lease.
- **Smile**: Cameras mounted downtown are monitored by the police and are recording your every move. Cameras at some main intersections are ready to catch you running a red light.







Many football, softball, soccer and ultimate frisbee games convene on the park's athletic fields, and spaces are available for birthday parties and other gatherings. More features include an outdoor workout area with elliptical and rowing machines, etc.; a playground, a picnic area,

meeting rooms, restrooms and walking trails. The Splash Pad is open Tues.—Sun. 10 a.m.—6 p.m. and is \$1 per person.

Other amenities include a three-acre lake, a seasonal swimming pool, picnic shelters, a playground, a confined dog park and the nature trail named after the late, legendary Athens cyclist Fred Birchmore. Memorial Park is also the home of the Athens Creative Theatre in Quinn Hall.

North Oconee River Greenway

The North Oconee River Greenway covers 150 acres; a "linear park" spanning more than 3.5 miles. The 10-foot wide path is perfect for walking and biking and connects local parks, neighborhoods and community centers, meeting Cook's Trail at Sandy Creek Nature Center, which goes on from that point to



Sandy Creek Park. Following the river south from the Nature Center to downtown, one can view 50 interpretive panels, along the half-mile Heritage Trail, that illustrate Athens transportation and manufacturing history. The Greenway will eventually follow the old Georgia Railroad bed out to Winterville and beyond.

Sandy Creek Nature Center

The Sandy Creek Nature Center is an educational preserve with four miles of hiking trails that connect to Cook's Trail and to the North Oconee River Greenway. Encompassing 225 acres, the Nature Center surrounds wetlands, woodlands and field ecosystems. Planetarium shows occur monthly with different educational themes. The center's newly renovated Environment, Natural Science and Appropriate Technology Building (ENSAT) houses interactive exhibits that reflect several different environments of Georgia, as well as a natural science resource library and live reptiles and amphibians. The remains of a 100-plus-year-old brick factory and a 19th Century log house are open for exploration. Check the weekly *Flagpole* Calendar for Sandy Creek's seasonal events and activities for kids. The park is open Tues.-Sat., 8:30 a.m.-5:30 p.m., and the trails are open year-round from sunrise to sunset.

Sandy Creek Park

Sandy Creek Park is the largest of the county's parks, encompassing 782 acres surrounding Lake Chapman. Miles of hiking trails hug the banks of the lake, offering hours of woods exploration, and connect with Cook's Trail to Sandy Creek Nature Center. A public beach, picnic sites, horse trails, playgrounds, fishing spots and basketball and tennis courts are more of the amenities offered. The park boasts a disc golf course (\$1 per person) and a public dog park, with several large, private dog parks available at \$1 per dog per hour. For ages 4–64, there is a \$2 entrance fee; for all others, admittance is free. Canoe, kayak and paddleboard rentals are available by reservation on weekends running from Memorial Day Weekend until Labor Day Weekend. Open summer, 7 a.m.–9 p.m. and winter, 9 a.m.–6 p.m. Spring and fall hours vary.

Southeast Clarke Park

Southeast Clarke Park covers more than 120 acres and includes the 1,700-sq. ft. World of Wonder Playground, the largest volunteer-built playground in the state of Georgia. Its castle-like structure holds slides, mazes, bridges and more. Residents can call to make reservations for the playground pavilion. Nearby, the Skate Park, partially funded by the Tony Hawk Foundation, is 14,000-sq. ft. of concrete ramps, bowls and steel rails, which are open to BMX bikers and skateboarders. For dogs and their owners, Wiggley Field (closed for renovations until June 2015) offers fenced-in dog parks with separate areas for small and large dogs if desired. Softball and soccer fields, a multi-court tennis center for recreation, classes and tournaments, a walking/jogging path and nature trails are more features of this versatile park. Open 9 a.m.—sunset.

State Botanical Garden of Georgia

The State Botanical Garden of Georgia is maintained by UGA and contains more than 300 acres. The Garden seeks to "acquire and disseminate botanical knowledge and to foster appreciation, understanding and stewardship of plants and nature," and includes five miles of well-kept nature trails, some of which follow the banks of the Oconee River. Several gardens are kept in year-round bloom, including the International Garden, Native Flora Garden, Shade Garden and Heritage Garden. The Garden's research staff provides programs and classes that celebrate the versatility, beauty and history of Southeastern flora, as well as the preservation of native species of medicinal plants. The garden is a popular venue for festivals, weddings and live music, and the Visitors Center houses a gift shop, café and three-story conservatory. Classes, seminars and art exhibitions are held all year long. Smoking and pets are not allowed on the premises. Garden grounds are open free to the public daily Oct.-Mar. 8 a.m.-6 p.m. and Apr.-Sept. 8 a.m.-8 p.m., excluding UGA holidays.

Watson Mill State Park

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
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


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
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between, Athens provides residents and visitors alike with a wide variety of locally produced craft beer. The number of breweries in Athens doubled in 2014 with the recent addition of Creature Comforts Brewing Company and the Southern Brewing Company opening its doors later in the year. Whether you're a fan of robust ales or traditional pilsners, Athens has just the beer for you. On the other hand, if you're one of those ambitious do-it-yourself types, rejoice! Athens has two local homebrew supply stores for your beer-making needs.

A quick primer on some relevant Georgia laws and facts regarding breweries:

- State law requires that brewery tours be conducted for educational purposes and be at least two hours in length.
- Consuming beer at a brewery does not require purchasing any tickets or merchandise, although it is a good idea to support a brewery by purchasing qift items from them
- Breweries are not allowed to sell beer directly to customers, thanks to Georgia's three-tier distribution system.

The oldest production brewery in Athens, Terrapin Beer Company, was founded in 2002 by Brian "Spike" Buckowski and John Cochran. Terrapin moved to its current location at 265 Newton Bridge Rd. in 2008 and has since become one of Athens' most popular destinations for live music and fresh beer. Terrapin opens its doors to visitors every Wednesday through Saturday from 5:30-7:30 p.m. During the tour, patrons can sample fresh beer straight from the source and discover new brews before they hit the shelves. Dogs are welcome at Terrapin but must remain leashed and outside of the brewing facility. Food is not currently prepared at the brewery, but occasionally local restaurants provide food there, and tour attendees are welcome to bring their own food. Terrapin hosts many events throughout the year at their brewery, so be sure to check the Calendar in Flagpole to stay informed about what's happening. You can find out what's literally brewing at

new product of particular interest is Liquid Bliss, a porter brewed with chocolate and peanut butter.

Creature Comforts Brewing Company opened its doors (and kegs) in April 2014. Located downtown in the former Snow Tire building at 271 W. Hancock Ave, the Creature Comforts brewery is a remarkable renovation and repurposing of the former tire shop. Reclaiming as much of the old wood and structure as possible, the interior of Creature Comforts' brewery is a striking balance between arthouse, warehouse and brewhaus. Tours take place 5:30-7:30 p.m. Tuesdays through Thursdays, 4:30-6:30 p.m. Fridays and 1:30-3:30 p.m. Saturdays currently but may change. Check the website for times. Four basic beers—a pilsner, amber ale, IPA and a tart Berliner Weisse—can be found on draft throughout Athens, and the brewery plans to create special one-off batches and pilot beers that tour-goers will be encouraged to sample. Creature Comforts beer will be available in cans to purchase from retailers in late summer 2014. The official website is creaturecomfortsbeer.com. Creature Comforts is the downtown location for the Athens Farmers Market on Wednesday evenings.

The Southern Brewing Company hasn't finished constructing its brewery at press time—due to the complex process of obtaining the proper licensing in Georgia, its opening date has been pushed back from July of 2014 to December or January. ("Byzantine" doesn't properly encapsulate the bureaucratic nightmare of opening a brewery in Georgia. If you're having problems sleeping, try reading some of our state laws about alcohol licensing.) The Southern Brewing Company's beers will be available this year in Athens, even before the brewery is finished. The brewery is in talks with Jailhouse Brewing out of Hampton, GA, to contract-brew its recipes. The Southern Brewing Company will be located at 231 Collins Industrial Blvd, near Athens Tech on Highway 29 in northeast Athens. The brewery will be situated on a wooded tract of land set back from the highway and will offer guided tours and a farmers' market, among other events. For the curious, its website (sobrewco.com) provides an intriguing glimpse into what's possible at SBC: blueberry saisons, beer brewed with Cherokee rose, wild yeast fermentations and other creative brews indicate that the Southern Brewing Company will be a welcome addition to Athens' growing craft beer scene.

If you're interested in grabbing dinner alongside your local brew, Copper Creek Brewing Company is Athens' only brewpub. Located at 140 E. Washington St. downtown, Copper Creek produces approximately 39 different beers annually, including traditional German, British and Belgian styles, as well as American interpretations of the classics. Only four are on tap at any given time, meaning that regular visitors to Copper Creek will be rewarded with new brews to quaff. The food includes burgers, soups, salads and other specialties designed to pair well with the brewery's offerings. Copper Creek also offers beer produced by other breweries, but the brews produced in-house are the clear winners. Copper Creek opens at 4 p.m. Monday-Friday, and 12 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays. Tuesday is the most popular day to visit Copper Creek, as all pints are only \$2 each. For more information, see coppercreekathens.com.


Visiting Athens' breweries may inspire you to try your own brewing skills. If you're feeling creative and ambitious, Blockader Homebrew Supply at 1145 N. Chase St, has everything for the beginning brewer and expert, and the brewers there are more than happy to provide assistance with recipes and techniques. Open Tuesday–Saturday, 11 a.m.–6 p.m., and 12–5 p.m. on Sundays.

Additionally, Five Points Growlers at 3685 Atlanta Hwy. offers ingredients and equipment, as well as brewing classes. The staff is knowledgeable and can point a beginning brewer in the right direction, accompanying products with support. They're open from 10 a.m.-10 p.m. Monday-Thursday, 10 a.m.-11:30 p.m. Fridays and Saturdays, and 12:30-9 p.m. on Sundays.

If you're interested in sharing your homebrew and learning from fellow enthusiasts, Athens has a club for you. ALEZ (Athens League of Extraordinary Zymurgists) meets every third Tuesday of the month at 7 p.m. at the Unitarian-Universalist Fellowship, 780 Timothy Rd.

Go forth and drink, Athens visitor/student/resident! We've got brews for days.





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
